(Port) Lorne

The township of Lorne was surveyed in February 1884 and named by Governor Robinson on 8th May1884 after a town in Argyllshire, Scotland. It is the hundred of Inkerman.

Saturday 22 March 1884

The survey of the new township at the beach near Middle Spit is completed, and I understand that the surveyors will soon shift camp to Dublin in order to complete the survey of the swamp land on the coast as far as Port Prime. This will finish the survey of the Hundreds of Inkerman and Dublin. I have not heard by what name the new





beach township is to be called, but if it is ever inhabited it will be a fine place, as the situation is pleasant, and the allotments, ninety-eight in number, contain a quarter of an acre each. Some farmers intend building wheat stores there, and one wheat buyer has already located himself on the spot. (2)

Saturday 19 December 1885

Port Lome boasts of five wheat-buyers this season, as against three last season, with double the quantity of wheat. The price is

from 3s. 7d. to 3s. $8^{1}/_{2}$ d., with an upward tendency. (4)

Tuesday 20 March 1894

A SUSPICIOUS FIRE.
Port Wakefield March 17.

Mr. B. D. Rouenfelds held an inquest yesterday Friday on a fire which occurred on March 8 at



Port Lorne, about 14 miles south of Port Wakefield on the Wild Horse Plains Beach. As the police wished to ventilate the case, which was somewhat suspicious, and as this was the third



general store that has burnt down within a few years at the same place, it has caused considerable comment.

Mr. C Chapman, storekeeper, whose shop was glutted by the fire on March 8th inst, had the same misfortune about 18 months ago. At the inquest he stated that at about 10 O'clock on the morning of March 8, while he was in dining-room attached to the shop, he heard cries of fire from his daughter, who was just returning from the beach. He saw smoke issuing from the south comer of the shop, and did all in his power to extinguish the flames, but they had a good hold before the alarm was given. Several children were playing close by. He called his man who came and assisted to put out the fire and remove furniture and other articles. He considered that the stook was worth about £250, and it was insured. Other witnesses were examined. but they could form no idea how the fire originated. The jury returned a verdict - "That the shop was wilfully set on fire by some one, but there is not sufficient evidence to prove by whom." (6)

Saturday 31st March 1928

METHODIST CHOIR PICNIC

On Saturday March 31st, the choir of the local Methodist Church, held their annual picnic at Port Lome. About a dozen cars conveyed them and friends to the beach, where the vehicles were arranged to provide shelter for the food. Perfect weather was enjoyed, and the time spent at various games, swimming, and looking at the wild waves. The more

actively inclined caught crabs, of which a good many were obtained, and provided supper. The Balaklava sub branch of the R. S. & S. I.L. A. also held their first picnic at the same time and place, though the two picnics in no way amalgamated. (7)

Wednesday 12 May 1954

Statement by Sir Philip McBride, Minister for Defence.

The Minister for Defence, Sir Philip McBride. said today that recently he had accepted an invitation from local residents to examine on the spot and discuss a request for access to be permitted during week-ends and holidays to beaches south of Sandy Point near Port Wakefield, portions of which are used as a Proof Firing Range.

So that the position would be clear, said the Minister, the following restrictions on access were necessary for the reasons shown.

PROHIBITED AREA:

The Port Wakefield Range Head, situated six miles south of Port Wakefield town and about one square mile near Sandy Point continuing south for eight miles to a point three miles below Lorne. The closing of this area is necessary for the security of instruments and equipment and for the protection of the public from the danger of unexploded missiles. (8)

The Pathway to Net Zero

In Australia we are told renewables are the cheapest form of electricity and here in SA (apart from Tassie hydro) we lead the nation with 71.5% renewables. Next best is Victoria at 36.8%. We are leading the charge, but we also have the highest average retail prices, 45.3c/kWh. Next highest is NSW with 33.84c/kWh (source: Canstar Blue). For the record, Victoria is 30.42c/kWh. So, if renewables are the cheapest, and we have the most, why are our retail prices the highest? There are two main reasons. First is the intermittent nature of wind and solar and the need for an alternative dispatchable source capable of powering the whole network at any time. The second is renewable subsidies, invisible to the wholesale market but embedded in the retail market. It is 8.10pm, May 27° as I write this. Currently SA is consuming just over 1800MW of electricity. However, just 56MW or 3% of this requirement is coming from our 2742MW of installed renewable capacity, the batteries are flat and contributing just 5MW. Gas or coal are supplying the other 97%, either generated here or coming from Victoria and this situation is common during Autumn.

When renewables begin their penetration of the market it is an easy fit, because full back-up is available from existing generators. However, as renewables gain market share, (with the aid of subsidies) they are able to undercut base load generators, investment stalls, equipment wears out and eventually base load generators withdraw from the market.

So, while base-load generators are unprofitable and there are less days when we need them, in times of low renewable generation they are absolutely essential. Until the day renewables can supply 24/7, 365 days of the year, a full back-up system is required.

Consequently, when renewables are in short of supply, dispatchable generation (coal & gas) goes through the roof – the more you need it, the more you pay, so here in SA where we need it the most, we pay the most.

The other price driver is the hidden consumer subsidies. The electricity market is a labyrinth of hidden hand-outs where renewable generators can make a profit selling their electricity for minus \$50MW on the back of the hidden consumer subsidies embedded in our retail accounts. Given the political climate, investment in new coal or gas is highly unlikely and we need to explore all options. That is why Peter Dutton has put the nuclear option on the table, an emission free dispatchable technology, as part of our mix. Sit tight for the coming scare campaign, which will assume Australian's are idiots and will feed us garbage.

We harness dangerous materials of all kinds every day, safely, because we understand their properties and how to handle them. France produces 70% of their electricity from nuclear and is the world's largest exporter of electricity because of its low production costs. They have power plants right next to towns and agriculture and receive no more radiation than you or I and their children don't have two heads. It is a mature industry with almost every one of the largest economies world-wide using it and building new reactors.

Surely, they can't all be wrong.

State Budget - record revenue but still worse off

It takes a special kind of incompetence to spend more and more money and still get worse outcomes. The State Budget was handed down 2 weeks ago amidst record ramping, record spending and record debt. Those who remember the State Bank collapse in 1991 will recall we were all left with a \$3.1 billion debt. As of this month, the Labor Government state debt is \$44 billion!

The price tag people pay for Labor's election promise to fix ramping is hefty. In their last 3 budgets, an ADDITIONAL \$7.1 billion has been thrown at the SA Health Department. It already has an annual budget of \$8 billion. The stories I hear about patients on waiting lists for essential treatment mixed with the statewide Code Yellow that forced the cancellation of hundreds of elective surgeries is just evidence of a broken system.

The Treasurer has confirmed that from 1st July, Revenue SA will commence collecting payroll tax from GP's based on a new interpretation of the law. Country doctors tell me that with the cost of health services skyrocketing this simply means that even more people will present to hospital emergency departments and clinics will be forced to pass the cost on to patients – or worse, medical practices will close.

Cuts to funding for regional roads and no long term relief for cost of living pressures makes for a very disappointing budget.

Grants for small business

This program will provide between \$2,500 and \$50,000, matched dollar for dollar by the business, to install energy efficient equipment or other improvements to help reduce or manage energy usage and costs. The promoters of the fixture are hopeful of securing a suitable piece of land for a course a short distance from the heach. If this can be accomplished, it will be a great advantage, as a small admission fee can then be charged to the grounds. At present the Committee have to rely on the unsolicited generosity of the public to help them financially. The various officials carried out their duties very satisfactorily. Mr R. L. Penrose was secretary, Mr M. R. Higgins acted as handicapper, Mr R. Kennedy a judge, and Mr. J. Mullins starter.

The chief event of the day was the Beer Stakes, 75 yards, for returned soldiers, first prize a boitle of beer. The beer was placed on the sand, and the first to reach it collected the prize. The entry was good, and the runners showed surprising turns of speed. Mr E Bowen held the prize almost within his grasp, when, horrible to relate, it began to recede into the distance. Mr R S Goldney, with malice aforethought and with intent to defraud, had tied a piece of string to the neck of the prize, and ran with it at the critical moment. fresh as a daisy, he had comparatively little trouble in keeping beyond his pursuers' range but Mr Bowen stuck to his guns, brought all his energy to bear on the ma:in hand (Mr Goldney's hand), and won the race.

At about 6 p.m. all sang "Auld Lang Syne" and started for home.

Community Car

The Mid North Community Passenger Network provides transport options for residents who are unable to access transport to medical, health and some personal appointments.

A community car based at Mallala is available for residents to attend medical or health appointments locally or in metropolitan areas. Accredited volunteer drivers collect passengers from their home and transport them to and from their appointment. Carers may travel free but must remain with the client at all times.

Eligible residents may be taken to medical, health and hospital appointments and some shopping and social activities (conditions apply).

This fee for service option provides flexibility and is available for appointment between 10am and 2pm Monday – Friday. Fees are based on distance travelled and include the return trip.

Veteran Affairs Gold cardholders may be entitled to service fee reimbursement. Outpatients of the Flinders Medical Centre, Royal Adelaide, Queen Elizabeth or Modbury Hospitals may also be eligible for reimbursement for all or part of travel costs.

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
