In the late 1800's the coaches would stop at Dublin to water the horses, pick up and drop of passengers. As time changed so did the vehicles and a need was recognised for a place to stop and have a break. The Mallala and Districts Lions Club took up this two and a half year challenge. With the assistance of the District Council of Mallala and local groups, the Dublin Lions Park was created. It opened on 6<sup>th</sup> May 1984, by John Meier MP and then handed over to the council. The park featured a covered BBQ, seating area, playground

and a toilet block which included a handicapped facility, (rare back then). It took 850 voluntary labour hours and cost \$10 000 (\$37,700 in today's money).



In 1984 the project won the inaugural Premiers Community Service Project Award for "developing a tourist and recreation park that was a very innovative one and indicates an understanding of the needs of travellers while also catering for the handicapped" South Australian Premier John Bannon presenting the award (above)

The park has evolved over time with new infrastructure - barbeque, seating, toilets, lighting , pathways, drainage and signage. The park gardens have had many replantings over time but some of the initial 600 plants are still part of the park today.





In 1998 a rose garden was planted. In 2001 the Dublin History Group placed a Time Capsule as part of South Australia's 150<sup>th</sup> celebration, which is to be opened in 2026 as part of Dublin's 150th Anniversary celebrations. The Dublin War Memorial and Pioneers Historical path, was constructed in 2003.

The park is used 24 hours a day 7 days a week. It is an important part of the Dublin's landscape. It is a gift given by the Mallala and Districts Lions Club that keeps giving. The Adelaide Plains Council does a wonderful job of keeping it neat and tidy and up to date.

It will be interesting to see what is the next development maybe a Tourist Information Bay and a playground. See page 17 for the 40<sup>th</sup> Celebrations of park

## **Coastal Development**

Alarm bells are ringing around Australia at our current level of migration; 659,000 last financial year. The reasons for the high level are various including a lack of workers, the return of international students following Covid, and many believe the government is encouraging high migration to mask our low productivity which has fallen by 5% in the last two years. In fact, we are in a per capita recession.

Many people struggle to grasp the connection between what governments do at the national and state level and their lives and may well ask; What particular impact does all this hold for the Dublin Community? The answer lies in the continuing and accelerating urban sprawl steadily gobbling agricultural lands of the Adelaide Plains. This expansion is not restricted to regular farmlands, but it is also raising interest in local beaches like Parham, Thompson, and Webb Beach's. It is obvious that if people are electing to

build north of Adelaide at places like Two Wells, Lewiston, Roseworthy, Angle Vale, and Mallala, like generations before them, they will be seeking to go the beach. Some will go further afield to places like the YP, EP or the beaches to the south, but increasing numbers will also looking to utilise their local beaches.

That is why I was pleased to discover **Plains** Adelaide the released discussion paper back in February and March on the future of the beaches and I hope locals took the opportunity to contribute. If you did not and wish you did, I would suggest you write to council directly to share your views. As a trainee pilot learns, poor planning sets the scene performance. for poor Change inevitable, and numbers at the local beaches will increase, but it will be local input that ensures the change leads to a better outcome for all including locals. visitors and the environment.

#### In Parliament

The Premier has axed the role of Minister for Regional Roads at a time when the RAA has noted backlog of the South Australian road maintenance has reached \$2 billion. Our roads are crumbling and we all know we need more investment not less.

The Labor reshuffle has also created a housing 'super' portfolio. For too long, our region has been experiencing the pressures of poor housing supply and rising construction costs.

This state government needs to do more to encourage first home buyers to enter the market instead of disincentives as linked to the National Construction Code (NCC).

Two Wells and Angle Vale are now deemed to be high risk for bushfire and according to the Master Builders Australia, new homes are slated to cost an additional \$21,000 in efforts to comply with the NCC.

### Grants for Mental Health Projects

The "In A Good Place" program gives regional groups the opportunity to access funds for community-driven projects and initiatives which focus directly on strengthening mental health, social and emotional health and wellbeing.

Community groups in towns with less than 10,000 residents can submit an expression of interest before 30 April, with full applications due on 15 May 2024. If you would like more information or a letter of support please call or email my office.

### Adelaide Plains Strategic Planning Consultation

Community consultation for the Adelaide Plains new Strategic Plan (2025-2028) has opened. The purpose of the plan is to identify the priorities of the area. This will determine where resources are directed.

The Adelaide Plains is growing rapidly and this consultation will be pivotal in influencing the liveability and sustainability of the area for future generations.






The Parham and District Action Group has contributed a memorial seat to the area. It had been placed in time for the event.

## Taking a Stand



The Parham and District Action Group (PADAG) have been particularly active in community involvement in recent times.

April 2<sup>nd</sup> marked a milestone for the Parham Campground with the completion of 12 months of operation under the auspices of PADAG and the Mallala and District Lions Club. The response of campers has been very favourable, and occupancy has been above that seen of recent years.

Under a memorandum of agreement PADAG and the Lions Club share the profits from the campground, under the condition that such profits are spent on projects within the community.

The first application of these funds is the provision of a memorial seat near the Remembrance Flag Pole in front of the Port Parham Sports and Social Club, provided just in time for this year's Anzac Dawn Service.



Port Parham, Dublin and Windsor will officially be 150 years old in 2026. A meeting was held on 14<sup>th</sup> April to initiate planning for activities to commemorate this milestone, and PADAG will be working with the Dublin History Group to celebrate on the Adelaide Cup weekend in 2026 (7<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> March 2026). Plan now to be involved!

PADAG is promoting the possibility of establishing a Neighbourhood/Rural Watch group in the area. A public information meeting was held at Dublin on April 17<sup>th</sup> and another will be held at Long Plains Football Club on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> May at 5pm. Depending on interest, another meeting will be held to formally establish the group.

PADAG will also assist in catering for the Dublin History Group History Month celebration of 40 Years of the Dublin Lions Park on 5<sup>th</sup> May.

To lift our profile in the community we have purchased flags to be used at events and activities of the group. We are hopeful that this will lead to dialogue with members of the community and get people involved.

Recently we have been looking at how to let people know what we have achieved and what we are looking to do in the future.

PADAG was established in 2017 in response to an attempt by the SA Government to take over the oval area behind the club. Since then, the following are some of the things which have been achieved.



## 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary D -Day and the Normandy Campaign

By 1944, with the Second World War in its fifth year, German forces still occupied France, Belgium, the Netherlands, the Balkans, Denmark, Norway, much of Italy, and large, but ever-shrinking, areas of eastern Europe.

It became clear that to defeat Germany the allies would have to launch an amphibious operation from Britain, landing on the coast of France. The invasion plan was known as operation overlord.

Months before the invasion allied bombers struck transport targets throughout France to isolate the invasion beaches and slow or prevent the movement of German reinforcements.

The landings that began around 6:30 am, were met in some instances by light resistance and in others, such as on Omaha Beach in the American sector, by a fierce defence that took hours and hundreds of lives to overcome. By the first afternoon the allies had established a series of beachheads along the Norman coast.

After the initial success of the landings, the campaign to break out of Normandy lasted until early august, as German resistance and the Norman countryside proved difficult for the allies to penetrate.

After months of fighting, Paris finally fell to the allies on 25 august and there was a widespread feeling that Germany might be defeated in 1944. But by the end of the year the Germans had regrouped, strengthened their defences on the border with France, and repelled an allied attempt to reach the Ruhr through the Netherlands, launching an offensive in the Ardennes that became known as the Battle of the Bulge, and prolonging the war until may 1945.

Operation overlord and the subsequent fighting in Normandy was borne mostly by United States, Canadian, British and French forces.

Soldiers, sailors and airmen from other countries, such as Poland, were also involved on the allied side.

Australia's involvement in overlord was limited. By June 1944 most Australian service personnel were engaged in the South West Pacific area, but estimates suggest that some 3000 Australians played a part.



#### **Australian involvement**

Australia's main contribution to D-Day was in the air. Some 2,000–2,500 Australian airmen serving in Royal Air Force and Royal Australian Air Force Squadrons took part in operations associated with the invasion.

Australian aircrew served in transport and glider-towing squadrons which delivered airborne troops on D-Day, in fighter and fighter -bomber squadrons which operated directly over the beaches, and in heavy bomber squadrons which dropped thousands of tons of bombs in support of the landings.

Some 500 Australian sailors served on Royal navy vessels, from battleships and corvettes to motor torpedo boats and landing craft. About a dozen Australian soldiers were also attached to British army formations to gain experience in preparation for amphibious operations in the Pacific later in the war.

Fourteen Australians are known to have been killed on D-Day: two members of the Royal Australian navy and twelve members of the Royal Australian Air Force. Many other Australian airmen lost their lives in operations directly related to the invasion of France in the period leading up to 6 June 1944 and in the days that followed, as allied air crew flew in support of ground troops now engaged in the bitter Normandy fighting.

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

## **Community Car**

The Mid North Community Passenger Network provides transport options for residents who are unable to access transport to medical, health and some personal appointments.

A community car based at Mallala is available for residents to attend medical or health appointments locally or in metropolitan areas. Accredited volunteer drivers collect passengers from their home and transport them to and from their appointment. Carers may travel free but must remain with the client at all times.

Eligible residents may be taken to medical, health and hospital appointments and some shopping and social activities (conditions apply).

This fee for service option provides flexibility and is available for appointment between 10am and 2pm Monday – Friday. Fees are based on distance travelled and include the return trip.

Veteran Affairs Gold cardholders may be entitled to service fee reimbursement. Outpatients of the Flinders Medical Centre, Royal Adelaide, Queen Elizabeth or Modbury Hospitals may also be eligible for reimbursement for all or part of travel costs.

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
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
